

This would have new and improved arts and cultural facilities for people of all ages. Based around the long derelict cinema site, it would provide a wider range of attractions for the town centre.

Open space and heritage

Ealing has been famously described as the "Queen of Suburbs". Should we keep it that way?

Many find it a very appealing place to live. The low rise feel to Ealing and its modest architecture gives it a distinct character, but this has

been marred in recent years by incongruous office and other developments.

Our Victorian heritage of green spaces is much loved but is often threatened by encroachment or overbearing buildings.

There are calls to give more protection to our

open spaces and to preserve important views and tree lined streets.

1. Which developments do you think have added to or detracted most from Ealing's character?

2. Should Ealing remain a low rise suburb or would taller buildings be acceptable?

3. How can we best look after and use our open spaces?

A vision for Ealing

"Let's make Ealing a destination, not become a dormitory – somewhere we are proud to live and want to work and visit."

With Crossrail coming, Ealing will be a very different place in 10 years' time. The town will not only be easier to reach, but also to leave.

People tell us that they want Ealing to become a place which more people visit for work and pleasure and where more people shop and work locally.

Through the Central Ealing Neighbourhood Forum you can influence how this could happen.

Shops, offices and jobs

Ealing's shops and traders remain strong but the quality varies.

The town centre is not well used by people living nearby. We're a centre for new businesses and further education but many residents choose to shop elsewhere and the local economy is fragile.

There is potential to improve the shops and strengthen what's on offer north of The Broadway. We could respond to Crossrail by making Ealing more of a hub for business, supporting entrepreneurs and making this an attractive place to create businesses and to work.

1. What would make you shop in Ealing more often? What kind of shops and services do you want to see more or less of?

2. Is it sensible to try to have more people arriving than leaving Ealing by Crossrail each day – to work, shop and enjoy what's on offer?

3. What would most attract people to set up and move businesses to Ealing?

Getting around

Ealing Broadway is one of west London's best connected centres but how pleasant is it to get around when you're here?



There are ideas to make Ealing more pedestrian friendly, improve accessibility to the car parks and provide free on-street parking.

Shoppers want to be able to get around without having to negotiate traffic. It is too easy for visitors to lose their bearings and signage is poor. There have long been calls to tackle congestion at Ealing Broadway

station and link it more obviously to the rest of the town centre.

2. How can we attract more people to travel to Ealing to shop, work and enjoy a day or night out?

3. How can all the different types of transport in Ealing be better connected with each other?
