The borough is likely to need a further 6 to 7 FE in the next decade. Up to 2019 LB Ealing projects that we will be 9 FE short in Ealing and Hanwell (approx 1,900 pupils).</p> <p>(Projections are not published down to ward level as the projections would be unreliable at small area level.)</p> <p>Parents already find difficulty finding places at schools within reasonable travel distance (primary schools</p>
